

8. MISCELLANEOUS

8.1 AWARDS

EB59.R6¹ The Executive Board,

Considering the desirability of maintaining at five the membership of the Committees of the Foundations for which the Director-General acts as Administrator;

Considering that in the case of the Léon Bernard, Darling and Dr A. T. Shousha Foundations it will, for this purpose, be necessary to amend the appropriate instruments governing these Foundations in order to take account of the increase in the number of the Vice-Chairmen of the Executive Board;

1. *DECIDES* to amend Article 1 of the Regulations of the Darling Foundation by substituting the words "the Vice-Chairmen of the Executive Board" for the words "the two Vice-Chairmen of the Executive Board";

2. *PROPOSES* to the Foundation Committees of the Léon Bernard and Dr A. T. Shousha Foundations that at the first available opportunity they amend the first Article of their respective Statutes by substituting in each case the words "one person serving on the Executive Board" for the words "two persons serving on the Executive Board".

*EB64(16)*¹ The Executive Board, recalling its wish expressed at the sixty-third session² for amendments in the prize-awarding procedure for the Foundations administered by WHO, examined the texts prepared in this respect jointly by the committees of the four Foundations. It adopted the proposed amendments to Articles 2 and 8 of the Regulations of the Darling Foundation, on the understanding that these would not affect the current selection procedure for the next award of the Darling Medal and Prize, but would be effective for future selection procedures only. It further endorsed the amendments to the texts relating to the Léon Bernard, Jacques Parisot, and Dr A. T. Shousha Foundations.

The Board, noting that it would in future have the final responsibility for the choice of the recipients of the awards of the Darling Foundation, as well as the Léon Bernard, Jacques Parisot and Dr A. 8.1.5 CHILD HEALTH FOUNDATION

1. Establishment and Statutes

EB66.R2 The Executive Board.

Having noted the proposal presented by Professor Ihsan Doğramaci, member of the Executive Board, for the establishment of a Child Health Foundation within the framework of the World Health Organization, to be funded by an endowment of US \$100 000 from Professor Doğramaci;

Having examined the proposed Statutes of the Child Health Foundation and having found them to be in line with the principles followed in adopting the texts governing the four existing foundations administered by the Organization;

Considering paragraphs 6.6 and 6.7 of the Financial Regulations of the World Health Organization;

1. PAYS TRIBUTE to the outstanding humanitarian spirit shown by the proposal of Professor Doğramaci and expresses its gratitude to him;

2. APPROVES the establishment of the Child Health Foundation in accordance with the attached Statutes.

ANNEX

STATUTES OF THE CHILD HEALTH FOUNDATION

Article 1
(Establishment)

Under the title of "Child Health Foundation", a foundation is established within the framework of the World Health Organization, which shall be governed by the following provisions.

Article 2
(The Founder)

The Foundation is established upon the initiative and with funds provided by Professor Ihsan Doğramaci (hereinafter referred to as "the Founder"), who has stipulated that his name shall not be associated with the title of the Foundation during his lifetime.

Article 3
(Capital)

The Founder endows the Foundation with an initial capital of US \$100 000. The capital of the Foundation may be increased by all the income from its undistributed reserves or by gifts and bequests.

During the first year following the establishment of the Foundation, the Founder shall invest the capital to generate dividends or interest for the benefit of the Foundation. Following this period, the Administrator shall be responsible for investment of the capital and any undistributed reserves.

Article 4
(Purpose)

The Foundation is established for the following purposes:

(1) the award of a prize, consisting of a bronze medal and a sum of money to be determined by the Foundation Committee, every two years to be given to a person having accomplished outstanding service in the field of child health, the prize being presented during a meeting of the Health Assembly to the recipient or, in his absence, to a person representing him; and

(2) the award every four years of a fellowship for research in social paediatrics, in accordance with the decision of the Foundation Committee in this respect.

Article 5
(Proposal and election of candidates
for the prize and the fellowship)

Any national health administration, the Executive Director of the United Nations Children's Fund (UNICEF), the Executive Committee of the International Paediatric Association and the Bureau of the International Children's Centre (Paris), as well as any former recipient of the prize, may put forward the name of a person for the prize. Candidates for the fellowship shall be proposed by the International Paediatric Association or the International Children's Centre (Paris). Proposals will be made to the Foundation Committee. The Executive Board of the World Health Organization shall determine the recipients of the prize and the fellowship on the proposal of the Foundation Committee.

Article 6
(Administration)

The Foundation shall be administered by its Administrator, namely the Director-General of the World Health Organization. The Administrator shall implement the decisions of the Foundation Committee, consisting of the Chairman and Vice-Chairmen of the Executive Board, a representative of the International Paediatric Association appointed by its Executive Committee, and a representative of the International Children's Centre (Paris), appointed by its Bureau. The presence of at least three members of the Committee shall be required for the taking of decisions.

Article 7
(Administrator)

The Administrator shall be responsible:

- (1) for the execution of the decisions taken by the Foundation Committee within the limits of its powers as defined in these Statutes; and
- (2) for the observance of the present Statutes and generally for the operation of the Foundation as limited by these Statutes.

Article 8
(Revision of the Statutes)

On the proposal of one of its members, the Foundation Committee may decide to revise the present Statutes. Such a decision, however, shall not be valid unless taken by an absolute majority. Any such revision shall be transmitted for information to the next World Health Assembly.

8.1.6 SASAKAWA HEALTH PRIZE

1. Establishment and Statutes

EB73.R13 The Executive Board,

Having noted the proposal presented by Mr Ryoichi Sasakawa, Chairman of the Japan Shipbuilding Industry Foundation and President of the Sasakawa Health Memorial Foundation, for the establishment of a Sasakawa Health Prize within the framework of the World Health Organization, to be funded

by an endowment of US\$ 1 million from the Japan Shipbuilding Industry Foundation;

Having examined the proposed Statutes of the Sasakawa Health Prize;

1. EXPRESSES its gratitude to Mr Sasakawa;
2. APPROVES the establishment of the Sasakawa Health Prize in accordance with the attached Statutes, as modified during its discussions.

ANNEX

STATUTES OF THE SASAKAWA HEALTH PRIZE

Article 1
Establishment

Under the title of the "Sasakawa Health Prize", a Prize is established within the framework of the World Health Organization, which shall be governed by the following provisions.

Article 2
The Founder

The Prize is established upon the initiative of and with funds provided by Mr Ryoichi Sasakawa, Chairman of the Japan Shipbuilding Industry Foundation and President of the Sasakawa Memorial Health Foundation.

Article 3
Capital

The Founder endows the Prize with an initial capital in Japan of US\$ 1 million. The capital of the Prize may be increased by income from its undistributed reserves or by gifts and bequests. The Founder shall designate the Sasakawa Memorial Health Foundation to be responsible for investment of the capital and any undistributed reserves.

Article 4
Prize

The Sasakawa Health Prize shall consist of a bronze statuette and a sum of money of the order of US\$ 100 000 to be given to a person or persons, an institution or institutions, or a nongovernmental organization or organizations having accomplished outstanding innovative work in health development, such as the promotion of given health programmes or notable advances in primary health care, in order to encourage the further development of such work. Current and former staff members of the World Health Organization, and current members of the Executive Board, shall be ineligible to receive the Prize. The sum of money, derived from the income and/or the undistributed reserves, shall be determined by the Prize Committee. The Prize shall be presented during a meeting of the World Health Assembly to the recipient(s) or to a person(s) representing the recipient(s).

Article 5
Prize Committee

The Committee entitled the "Sasakawa Health Prize Committee" shall be composed of the following members: the Chairman and Vice-Chairmen of the Executive Board, and a representative appointed by the Founder.

The presence of the Chairman of the Executive Board and at least two other members of the Committee including the rep-

representative appointed by the Founder shall be required for the taking of decisions.

Article 6

Proposal and selection of candidates for the Prize

Any national health administration as well as any former recipient of the Prize may put forward the name of a candidate for the Prize. Proposals shall be made to the Administrator who will submit them to the Prize Committee together with his technical comments. The Committee will decide in private meeting, by a majority of the members present, on the recommendation to be made to the Executive Board of the World Health Organization, whose decision shall be final.

Article 7

Administrator

The Prize shall be administered by its Administrator, namely the Director-General of the World Health Organization, who shall act as Secretary of the Prize Committee.

The Administrator shall be responsible:

- (1) for the execution of the decisions taken by the Prize Committee within the limits of its powers as defined in these Statutes; and
- (2) for the observance of the present Statutes and generally for the administration of the Sasakawa Health Prize in accordance with these Statutes.

Article 8

Accountability

Reports on work carried out by recipients of the Prize shall, where appropriate, be submitted annually to the Administrator, who shall be accountable to the World Health Assembly for operations effected by virtue of these Statutes.

Article 9

Revision of the Statutes

On the motion of one of its members, the Prize Committee may propose revision of the present Statutes. Any such motion, if endorsed by a majority of the members of the Committee, shall be submitted to the Executive Board for its approval. Any revision shall be reported for information to the next session of the World Health Assembly.

1. Medical Ethics

EB55.R64 The Executive Board,

Having considered the report by the Director-General on the development of principles of medical ethics contained in his report concerning coordination with other organizations of the United Nations system on general matters,

1. NOTES the invitation to WHO by the United Nations General Assembly in resolution 3218 (XXIX) "to draft, in close cooperation with such other competent organizations, including the United Nations Educational, Scientific and Cultural Organization, as may be appropriate, an outline of the principles of medical ethics which may be relevant to the protection of persons subjected to any form of detention or imprisonment against torture and other cruel, inhuman or degrading treatment or punishment, and to bring the draft to the attention of the Fifth United Nations Congress on the Prevention of Crime and the Treatment of Offenders...";

2. REQUESTS the Director-General, in compliance with resolution 3218 (XXIX) of the United Nations General Assembly, to prepare the relevant document for submission to the Fifth United Nations Congress on the Prevention of Crime and the Treatment of Offenders to be held in Toronto, Canada, in 1975; and

3. SUGGESTS to the Director-General that he consult with the World Medical Association and other nongovernmental organizations in official relations with WHO and relevant intergovernmental organizations, including UNESCO, and with Member States in order to facilitate the preparation of the above document.

Noting the document prepared by the Director-General, entitled "Health aspects of avoidable maltreatment of prisoners and detainees", which was submitted to the Fifth United Nations Congress on the Prevention of Crime and the Treatment of Offenders and to the United Nations General Assembly at its thirtieth regular session; and

Having considered the further invitation to WHO by the United Nations General Assembly in resolution 3453 (XXX) "to give further attention to the study and elaboration of principles of medical ethics relevant to the protection of persons subjected to any form of detention or imprisonment against torture and other cruel, inhuman or degrading treatment or punishment",

1. NOTES the report of the Director-General;
2. NOTES the recent Declaration adopted by the Twenty-ninth World Medical Assembly in Tokyo in October 1975, entitled "Guidelines for medical doctors concerning torture and other cruel, inhuman or degrading treatment or punishment in relation to detention and imprisonment"; and
3. REQUESTS the Director-General:
 - (1) to collaborate with other organizations of the United Nations system having responsibilities in this field, as well as with the World Medical Association, the Council for International Organizations of Medical Sciences and other non-governmental organizations concerned, for the purpose of developing codes of medical ethics, including those related to the protection of persons subjected to any form of detention or imprisonment against torture and other cruel, inhuman or degrading treatment or punishment; and

THE ROLE OF PHYSICIANS AND OTHER HEALTH WORKERS IN THE PRESERVATION AND PROMOTION OF PEACE

WHA32.24 The Thirty-second World Health Assembly,

Recalling resolution WHA30.43,¹ in which it is proclaimed that the attainment by all the peoples of the world by the year 2000 of a level of health that will permit them to lead a socially and economically productive life is the main social target of governments and of WHO;

Reaffirming the statement in the Declaration of Alma-Ata to the effect that an acceptable level of health for all the peoples of the world by the year 2000 can be attained through fuller and better use of the world's resources, a considerable part of which is now spent on armaments and military conflicts, and that a genuine policy of independence, peace, détente and disarmament could and should release additional resources that could well be devoted to peaceful aims and in particular to the acceleration of social and economic development, of which primary health care is an essential part;

Noting resolutions 33/72 A, 33/91 E, 33/71 H and 33/66 B and other resolutions adopted in recent years by the United Nations General Assembly on the maintenance and strengthening of peace, extension of détente, averting of the threat of nuclear war, prohibition of the development of new types of weapons of mass destruction, banning of aggressive military conflicts, and attainment of the objectives of true disarmament;

Recalling also the contribution that WHO has already made to the strengthening of peace and cooperation between nations, notably resolution WHA15.51 on the role of the physician in the preservation and promotion of peace, resolution WHA20.54 on weapons of mass destruction, and resolutions WHA22.58 and WHA23.53 on prohibition of the production and stockpiling of chemical and bacteriological (biological) weapons;

WHA34.38 The Thirty-fourth World Health Assembly,

Having considered the reports of the Executive Board and of the Director-General on the Global Strategy for the attainment of health for all by the year 2000¹ and the contribution of health to the socioeconomic development of countries, particularly developing countries, as well as to the preservation and promotion of peace as the most significant factor for the protection of people's life and health;

Bearing in mind the provisions of the WHO Constitution stating that the attainment of the highest possible standard of health of peoples, on the basis of the fullest cooperation of individuals and States, is one of the fundamental factors for peace and security, and also resolution 34/58 of the United Nations General Assembly stating that peace and security, in their turn, are important for the preservation and improvement of the health of all people, and that cooperation among nations on vital health issues can contribute importantly to peace;

Recalling the provision of the Alma-Ata Declaration emphasizing that an "acceptable level of health for all the people of the world by the year 2000 can be attained through a fuller and better use of the world's resources, a considerable part of which is now spent on armaments and military conflicts";

Recalling resolutions WHA13.56, WHA13.67, WHA15.51, WHA17.45, WHA20.54, WHA22.58, WHA23.53, WHA32.24, WHA32.30, WHA33.24² and others on the role of the physician in the preservation and promotion of peace, the protection of mankind against nuclear radiation, the reduction of military expenditures and the allocation of the resources thus released to socioeconomic development and also to public health, especially in developing countries;

Considering the present aggravation of the international situation and the growing danger of thermonuclear conflict, whose unleashing in any form and on any scale will inevitably lead to irreversible destruction of the environment and the death of hundreds of millions of people, and also to grave consequences for the life and health of the population of all countries of the world without exception and of future generations, thus under-

mining the efforts of the States and WHO to achieve health for all by the year 2000;

Noting further the growing concern of physicians and other health workers in many countries at the mounting danger of thermonuclear war as the most serious threat to the life and health of all populations and their desire to prevent thermonuclear disaster, which is an indication of their increased awareness of their moral, professional and social duty and responsibility to safeguard life, to improve human health, and to use all means and resources for attaining health for all;

1. REITERATES most strongly its appeal to Member States to multiply their efforts to consolidate peace in the world, reinforce détente and achieve disarmament so as to create conditions for the release of resources for the development of public health in the world;

2. REQUESTS the Director-General:

(1) to expedite and intensify the study of the contribution that WHO, as a United Nations specialized agency, could and should make to economic and social development and to facilitate the implementation of the United Nations resolutions on strengthening peace, détente and disarmament and preventing thermonuclear conflict, creating for this purpose an international committee composed of eminent experts in medical science and public health;

(2) to continue collaboration with the Secretary-General of the United Nations and with other governmental and nongovernmental organizations, to the extent required, in establishing a broad and authoritative international committee of scientists and experts for comprehensive study and elucidation of the threat of thermonuclear war and its potentially baneful consequences for the life and health of peoples of the world.

4. URGES Member States to give careful consideration to the conclusions of the report;

5. REQUESTS the Director-General:

(1) to publish the report with all its scientific attachments and to preface it with this resolution;

(2) to ensure that wide publicity is given to the report;

(3) to transmit the report to the Secretary-General of the United Nations with a view to its consideration by the appropriate United Nations and other bodies;

Recalling United Nations General Assembly resolution 3435 (XXX) of 9 December 1975 calling upon the Member States responsible to carry out their obligations by removing those remnants and redressing the damage caused by their existence;

1. REQUESTS States to clear the material war remnants, especially mines;

2. REQUESTS the States that laid these mines to cooperate in this process as far as possible by providing appropriate assistance and information regarding the types and exact location of the mines and other explosives, and regarding other relevant questions;

3. REQUESTS the Director-General to report to the Thirty-sixth World Health Assembly on the situation related to health and the progress achieved.
